

This is all thanks to a revegetation and nesting box program at Brady Reserve. What a great way to bring in World Environment Day on 5 June. Council meetings are held in the city chambers at the Dandenong Civic Centre, 225 Lonsdale Street, Dandenong, commencing at 7pm.



Council loves to seek ideas and feedback from the community when it comes to developing our open space.

In 2024 we went out to the community to help us create a Draft Master Plan for Spring Valley Reserve. The 32ha reserve started life as a landfill site (1993-1998) and Council has been rehabilitating it for community use since 2018.

Spring Valley Reserve currently includes extensive open space, as well as walking paths, a picnic and barbecue area, halfsize basketball court, dog off-leash area, two playgrounds, a public toilet, fitness equipment and a beach volleyball court. Consultation revealed our residents have a strong connection to the park and want to see it further developed.

We are working with environmental consultants who monitor the reserve and will also talk with other local councils involved in the ongoing maintenance of the site. This will take some time, and I thank you all for your patience as we work through this process. To stay



updated you can follow the project on our Have Your Say page on Council's website

More recently we sought feedback on a draft concept plan for Alex Wilkie Nature Reserve and Sense Trail.

► Springvale South Ward

The plan included upgrades to car parking, seating along the trail, improvements to wayfinding signage and the addition of nature play elements. The upgrades will improve accessibility, promote biodiversity in our city and construct an ecological watering system.

Council officers are now reviewing the feedback and will finalise the concept plan before sharing it with the community. Upgrade works are expected to begin in the coming months.

Alex Wilkie is a valuable resource for our community and will reopen to the public in spring.

During Refugee Week this month I will be reflecting on the great opportunities I have had in Australia and Greater Dandenong, to make a new life and contribute back to our community.

Little Library in Noble Park



Borrowing items from the library is about to get easier for Noble Park residents.

The introduction of a Little Library outside Noble Park Train Station will allow library members to pick up holds and return items at their convenience, giving them around the clock access to our libraries.

A Little Library has been operating with great success at Menzies Avenue, Dandenong North, since late 2023.

Noble Park Ward Councillor and Deputy Mayor, Cr Sophie Tan welcomed the new addition coming to Noble Park in mid-2025.

"All you will need is a library card and access to the library website to put items on hold,"

Cr Tan said.

"The Little Library Lockers will be available 24/7. This is a new level of convenience for Noble Park locals, and with 40,000 pedestrians passing through the train station precinct every day, more people than ever can borrow items from our libraries."

90 years young and no sign of stopping

There's no stopping Greater Dandenong Crossing Supervisor, Austin who turned 90 on May 29.

Austin has been working for Council as a crossing supervisor since 2008 and led an incredible life prior to arriving in Australia.

Born in Sri Lanka, at the age of 16 Austin was selected to train with the Royal Air Force in England for Aircraft Servicing and Maintenance.

He went on to have successful careers with the Royal Ceylon Air Force and British Airways, before taking up management roles, including in the automotive industry. His mechanical expertise led to an opportunity in Saudi Arabia before returning to England and eventually retiring in 2003.

"I was invited to Australia and initially applied for a six-month visa, though I was not permitted to work, I was allowed to volunteer, which led me to AMES (Australian Multicultural Education Services) where I taught English to refugees," Austin said.

"I found Australia warm and welcoming, with blue skies even in autumn and winter, and thriving Sri Lankan community, whose weekend parties I thoroughly enjoy throughout the year. I applied for permanent residency, which I was granted after two years."

Austin said he is fortunate to visit his family including four daughters,11 grandchildren and eight (and counting) great grandchildren each year in England and Scotland.

"I am aiming for that special birthday card from the King... hopefully still as a crossing Supervisor!"

Happy birthday Austin and thanks for your contribution to our great city.

It builds on our understanding, commitment, and respect for the oldest living Culture in the world, to support a deeper relationship with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders based in sharing, listening, care, trust, and truth telling and understanding.

We have been developing our draft Third Innovate RAP in close consultation with the local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community. Traditional Custodians the Bunurong people who are represented by the Bunurong Land Council, local gathering places, and Aboriginal health and community organisations.

We'll keep you posted and in due course, we'll be seeking your feedback on the draft and how we can best support the strengthening of relationships, show respect and improve opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in our new RAP.

Gliders return to restored habitat

A conservation project to rebuild native habitats has seen the return of the Krefft's Gliders (formerly known as sugar gliders) to Greater Dandenong.

Previously thought locally extinct, the gliders have been recorded in our city for the first time ever.

"I am so proud that for the first time ever, Krefft's Gliders have been recorded in the City of Greater Dandenong," Mayor, Councillor Jim Memeti said.

"This is a huge win for local conservation and a sign that our long-term efforts to restore habitat are working."

A group of students from EcoSkills TAFE made the discovery on a recent field trip to monitor nesting boxes in Brady Road Reserve, Dandenong North.

The nesting boxes were installed in early 2024 as part of landscape restoration efforts along Lower Dandenong Creek.

Krefft's gliders are more than cute – they help pollinate native plants and control insect populations, making them vital to healthy ecosystems.

Over recent years we have been working to revegetate vital habitat corridors across our city. These corridors are not just for gliders – they are also helping to restore conditions for echidnas, native pollinators and other native wildlife we want to being back to Greater Dandenong.

Everybody in the community can support these conservation efforts by signing up to our Gardens for Wildlife Program, or joining a community tree planting day.

Fun glider facts

- ► They can glide up to 50 metres in one leap!
- Gliders usually have one or two joeys at a time and can live up to 9 years in the wild.
- ► They are nocturnal, social, and live in small family groups so if you spot one, there are probably more nearby.
- Each nest box is made from reclaimed redgum and are big and sturdy – weighing around 60kg and measuring 50cm tall with a 30cm diameter, designed to mimic large tree hollows.

A big thank you to everyone who shared their thoughts during the 2021 community consultation - your ideas helped create a playground that's welcoming, fun and made for everyone.



The people's hall turns 100



Noble Park residents came together to celebrate a major milestone for the Noble Park Public Hall on April 5.

They marked 100 years of community spirit, dedication and shared memories.

Greater Dandenong Mayor, Councillor Jim Memeti attended the celebration and shared in the memories of several generations of locals who had used the hall.

Cr Memeti said the hall was always the centre of community life in Noble Park.

"Built on land generously donated by the Buckley family, this hall has been the cornerstone of the Noble Park community since its inception," Cr Memeti said.

"In 1917 a trust was formed. decreeing that the land should be owned by the residents. This is still the case 100 years on."

A board of trustees continues to manage the hall, ensuring the community connection stays in place.

"Although the residents of Noble Park still own the property, the buildings are leased to Council and this partnership allows us to maintain this essential community hub."

Over its history the hall has hosted everything from public meetings to community dances, sports club meetings, a museum and dance classes, and now hosts a childcare centre, kindergarten, maternal and child health services and Council's customer service centre.

Timeline

1913 - Residents raised money to build the original timber hall

1925 - a new and improved public hall was built and became central to community life

1980 - an annexe was added to the building and named after long-time trustee AJ Paddy O'Donoghue. Disaster struck later when a fire tore through the brick hall

2006 - the community celebrates the opening of the newly constructed Paddy O'Donoghue Centre

2025 - Noble Park gathers to share memories for the centenary of the hall.

How to report noise complaints

At Greater Dandenong City Council, we work with Environment Protection Authority (EPA) to regulate noise issues in your neighbourhood, but who do you call when you have a complaint?

In the first instance you should approach your neighbour and share your concerns in a friendly manner. If that fails you can report your issue to the relevant authority.

Batteries don't belong in bins



When batteries are put in household bins they can cause fires, in both the bins and the trucks that collect them.

This includes AA and button batteries, as well as car batteries, and those from laptops, mobile phones, power tools, cameras and toys. All batteries contain toxic substances that can pollute the environment when disposed of in landfill.

The good news is they can be recycled through special collection points.

Here are some simple suggestions to store your batteries safely at home before taking them to a drop-off point:

- ► Cover the ends of used batteries with tape to prevent sparking and reduce the risk of fire
- ► Store them in a glass container and make sure the container is not airtight
- ► Don't store them in metal containers or with other metal
- ► Store them in a cool, dry place away from heat sources
- Keep them away from children and pets.

Visit to explore the everyday lives of a group of prominent locals who lived in the region during the late nineteenth and early-to-mid twentieth centuries.


Laurel Lodge and Benga House also offer opportunities to explore creative outlets, including tours, classes and exhibitions, and regularly welcome artists for short term residencies.


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Tech connecting job seekers to careers

A collaboration between the GameChange initative and South East Local Learning and Employment Network (SELLEN) will see Virtual Reality (VR) headsets shared with organisations to give job seekers a fully immersive experience.

The program is an extension of the Victorian Virtual Industry Careers Experience (VIC VICE), designed to help students explore career opportunities in an immersive and interactive way.

It is a shining example of how technology can bridge the gap between education and employment, empowering job seekers to make informed decisions about their futures.

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Participants can perform simulated tasks that mirror real-life roles. This hands-on approach helps individuals gain a better understanding of job roles, build confidence and identify career paths that align with their skills and interests.

Key features include:

Supporting local artists

Over summer, the Busk Stop program entertained visitors across Dandenong with live street performances.

Events were held every Friday and Saturday in Palm Plaza and Harmony Square.

The initiative saw local musicians, singers and dancers perform at designated 'Busk Stops'.

The pilot program was used to identify which busk stops work best and how busking contributes to life in our community. The program was a great opportunity for local performers and helped make public spaces more welcoming and enjoyable.

Performing artists were invited through social media and a partnership was

formed with Council's Youth Services Team targeting young people through the FReeZA committee.

One participant said of the program: "We have played open mic, gigs and festivals and we have run workshops and sing-alongs with large groups, but we have never done street-level busking before. In fact, we weren't really sure we were a 'busking' act. After our Busk Stop experience we are very keen to participate in that program again."

The successful pilot program has seen the introduction of a busking permit for local performers, with the aim to encourage and support a busking culture in our activity centres.

State Emergency Services and Volunteer Levy is not a Council charge



The State Government plans to replace the Fire Services Property Levy (FSPL) with a larger Emergency Services and

Volunteers Fund (ESVF), effective from 1 July 2025.

If this passes through parliament, councils will be asked to collect the fee for the State Government through rates notices although it is not a Local Government charge. This is the same arrangement that is in place for the Fire Services Levy but it will be more expensive as it will support funding to additional emergency services.


Council will be expected to pass this on directly to the State Government. We will update you through Council News and our website. Our Annual Rate Notice also sets out what are Council rates and charges, and which are state government levies and charges.
