

Meet your new Mayor and Deputy Mayor



Greater Dandenong's energetic new Mayor and Deputy Mayor started their term strongly, pledging to get the fundamentals right and serve with integrity.

Mayor, Councillor Sophie Tan and Deputy Mayor, Councillor Phillip Danh are unified in their belief that the key to strong leadership, is listening to the community.

"As a Councillor Group, and alongside CEO, Jacqui Weatherill, we will work together respectfully and effectively so you can have confidence in your Council," Mayor Tan said.

"We have heard that you want us to get the fundamentals right and we're energised to deliver the infrastructure and services you need," Cr Danh added.

Key priorities for 2026 include progressing major projects like the Dandenong aquatic and wellbeing centre and finalising the Perry Road upgrade. There are also significant improvements planned for McCrae Street and preparing to rollout the State Government mandated purple glass bin service.

Mayor Tan is a resident of more than 30 years and was elected to Councillor for the Noble Park ward in 2019. She

has served as Deputy Mayor twice including in 2021 and during the last Mayoral term.

Cr Tan said this experience had strengthened her understanding of leadership which is further bolstered by her background in business, commerce and financial services.

"This city is not just where I live, it is my home. I have seen our community grow, face challenges and thrive, and I'm committed to giving back to the place that has given me so much."

Deputy Mayor Danh, the Yarraman Ward Councillor, is a law graduate and said he was drawn to public service by a love of the Greater Dandenong community.

"This is the community I grew up in and lived in my entire life. I've seen first-hand how Local Government can make a difference in people's lives, not just through the big projects but through the everyday services people rely on.

"To me leadership is about making tough but effective decisions in the interests of our residents who want us to get the basics right. They want us to maintain local roads, make sure facilities are accessible and local parks are clean. They want us to ensure the local libraries are open and to advocate on their behalf to keep the cost of living down. Our residents don't ask for much but they deserve what's best."

Both newly-elected Councillors thanked outgoing Mayor, Cr Jim Memeti, for his support and dedicated service to the community during his sixth term as Mayor.

"Jim, your wisdom and experience have guided this Council, and I have valued your advice and mentoring throughout my time as Deputy Mayor," Cr Tan said.





Manufacturing powerhouse of Australia



The Greater Dandenong region has once again affirmed its reputation as the manufacturing heart of Victoria.

A recent report confirmed the Greater South East Melbourne region has more manufacturing jobs and businesses per capita than any other part of Australia.

The report, released by Deloitte Access Economics describes the region as "Australia's manufacturing powerhouse". producing \$89 billion in output. But it isn't just Victoria's manufacturing heart, it's Australia's industrial engine room.

The numbers back it up: the region is home to 3,801 manufacturing businesses, employing more than 75,000 people. One in four Victorian manufacturing jobs are based here, and the sector generates a staggering

\$89 billion in output. That's more than Adelaide's entire manufacturing footprint and it's overtaken Western Sydney too.

From precision-engineered metal parts for defence and healthcare to coconut yoghurt and cold pressed juices, the diversity is impressive.

Greater South East Melbourne (GSEM) is made up of eight local government areas, including Cardinia, Mornington Peninsula, Casey, Frankston, Kingston, Knox, Monash and Greater Dandenong.

With this momentum GSEM leaders are calling for more investment in transport, skills development and industrial land availability to keep the region thriving.

You may have seen new parking meters in Central Dandenong, Dandenong Market and 'Number 8' Balmoral Car Park in Springvale.

You can now pay in new ways – by app and online. We're also upgrading some existing meters so you can still pay with cash if you prefer and we will provide clear signage to these meters.

No matter how you pay, you no longer need to keep track of a paper ticket – just type your car's registration number into the app or meter and away you go.

Save money and time paying by app or online

Only pay for what you need – if you head back to your car early, you can cancel the remainder of your parking session and save money.

- ▶ Top up your parking without returning to your car (within signed time limits). This is great if you are stuck in a meeting or need a few extra minutes shopping or running errands.
- You can choose which app you use.
 Our technology supports popular apps EasyPark and Paystay.

We're not making any changes to parking fees this financial year. The fees will be reviewed as usual as part of the 2026/27 Budget process.

When it comes to success stories, Dandenong Veterinary Hospital stands out. In December 2025, the practice celebrates 100 years in operation.

Founded in 1925 by renowned Scottish veterinarian Dr William Hogarth-Scott, the hospital began at his Hemmings Street residence before later moving to 245 Lonsdale Street, opposite the Town Hall. In 1972, the practice relocated to the purpose-built veterinary hospital at 118 Princes Highway, where it still operates today.

The hospital has passed through five owners over the century, as Dandenong has grown from a farming township with horse yards out the back to a thriving, multicultural hub. The service has evolved from caring primarily for horses and cattle to for companion animals such as dogs and cats. They also treat injured local wildlife at no cost.

"It feels incredibly special to be anchored in this community for such a breadth of time," Dr Darren Shortt, principal veterinarian and business owner said.

The hospital cares for thousands of pets each year and many clients have been with them for multiple generations.

"One of my most memorable experiences was being there to bring a puppy into the world via caesarean section, and then, over a decade later, being there with the family at the pet's final moment," Dr Shortt said.

"It's an extraordinary privilege to be part of the full circle of life for the animals and families we serve."

"What hasn't changed in 100 years is the love people have for their animals and our commitment to caring for them as family," Dr Shortt said.

"We are also very aware of the legacy we carry. With only five owners in 100 years, each one has had a hand in shaping the hospital we have today. It's both humbling and inspiring to continue that story."

Looking after your pets in summer



Soaring summer temperatures can be dangerous for pets but

with some extra care we can look after our furry friends.

Tips for keeping your pets safe in summer include:

- ▶ Never leave your pets in hot cars. Even with the window open a parked car can quickly become a furnace. Pets can suffer heat stroke or brain damage which can lead to death in as little as six minutes. If you find a distressed pet left unattended in a car phone 000 immediately.
- Provide ample shade and access to fresh water. Watch for signs of heatstroke, including excessive panting, lethargy and vomiting.
- Avoid exercising animals in the hottest part of the day to protect their paws from the hot pavement.

Summer can also be a time for celebration and fireworks. If fireworks are scheduled in your neighbourhood, you can help nervous animals prepare by keeping them indoors in a secure space. Try to block out outside noise and light and provide toys and treats to distract them.

Your new kerbside bin service



Under the Victorian Government's Recycling Victoria plan, there are key actions that all councils must take, and some led from the state. Good progress is being made on the key actions:

- ✓ Introduce a Food Organics Garden Organics service (FOGO)
- ✓ Introduce a Container Deposit Scheme (CDS)
- ✓ Ban single-use plastics
- ✓ Now the mandatory Kerbside Glass Bin Collection Service is on the way.

Greater Dandenong residents currently have access to three kerbside bin services, including general waste (red lids), mixed recycling (yellow lids) and optional food and garden waste (lime green lids).

The new purple lid glass bin service is part of a mandatory 4-stream waste and recycling service for Victorian households.

The Victorian Government has legislated that a glass service must be provided by all Councils by July 2027. The purple-lid glass bin service is not optional for councils or households.

Separation of household waste and recycling into the four material streams (general waste, mixed recycling, food and garden waste, glass) reduces contamination. It increases the volume and quality of materials we can recover for recycling.

When glass mixes with other recyclables in our yellow-lid bins, it can break which contaminates paper and cardboard, making them unrecyclable. Separating glass means cleaner recycling, more materials are reused. and less waste is sent to landfill. The glass bin will be collected once every four weeks.



New bin coming soon.



There are no proposed changes to the weekly red general rubbish bin and yellow mixed recycling and green food and garden waste bin collection services at this stage. We will provide more information as we work towards introducing this service in 2027.

Unexpected days in the life of a **Council Ranger**

At Council, we're lucky enough to attract talented staff who honed their skills and practised their passions before putting them to use for the **Greater Dandenong community.** Jennie Jean Pierre is no exception.

Jennie has been a ranger with Greater Dandenong City Council for three years, following a career at the RSPCA.

Jennie said her days might involve responding to community reports about barking dogs or dog attacks, collecting stray animals from vet clinics and reuniting pets with their owners.

"Our work can be challenging sometimes we're meeting people on one of the hardest days of their lives, but it can also be rewarding and heartwarming."

Council's small team of rangers has learned to expect the unexpected.



"Each day surprises us."

Jennie said the rangers were proud of the way they could find common ground and build relationships with residents.

"We want to work with the community not against them.

"I think sometimes people see us just as enforcement but they may not realise we're here for education and to assist the community as well."

Jennie encouraged residents to give Council a call when they first encounter an animal issue.

"We have lots of programs and options available and can also refer you on to people who can help. For example, people often think they're doing the right thing by feeding a stray cat rather than calling us to report it.

"One hungry cat quickly becomes 100 hungry cats. Cats have a litter of about six kittens and then six to nine months later those six kittens have six kittens of their own."

For the safety of wildlife and pets, we've introduced a cat curfew in Greater Dandenong.

"We hope it helps to reduce the number of cats breeding so that it is a manageable population and everybody who comes to our pound can be rehomed."

We successfully advocated for **Federal Government Funding to** upgrade sport and recreation infrastructure in Greater Dandenong.


Following our engagement with the community in November, we are reviewing your feedback on the proposed projects below, with a plan to start work in 2026.

- Shade structures and change room upgrade at Ross Reserve


Join us for the Fun Run, Walk and Roll on Saturday 24 January as we celebrate the Australia Day long weekend.

Stub it. Bin it: Cleaning up Springvale's most littered item



Cigarette butts are the most littered item in Greater Dandenong so we're stepping up efforts to reduce this litter.

A recent audit conducted as part of the Tangaroa Blue Let's Strain the Drains program found over 3,803 cigarette butts in litter traps throughout the city. This makes up more than 80 per cent of the items trapped.

Although small, cigarette butts have a big impact on the environment. They contain plastic and toxic chemicals that pollute, harm wildlife and contaminate waterways. They wash out to sea and don't break down easily, making proper disposal essential.

Here's how you can help:

- ► Always stub out your cigarette before placing it in a bin to avoid starting a fire
- ► Use the **ashtray top bins** provided.

To reinforce these messages and as part of our commitment to revitalising Springvale and creating a cleaner, more welcoming environment for everyone, we've installed:

- ► Bin signs
- ► Decals on council-provided bins with ashtray tops
- Ground decals pointing to the nearest ashtray top bin.

Together, we can protect our environment and take pride in our public spaces.

Are you prepared for an emergency?

Emergencies can come in many forms and can happen at any time, affecting you in ways you don't expect.

Having a plan in place can save you and your loved ones a lot of stress and help you to recover quickly.

Heatwave

Heat kills more Australians than any other natural disaster. Extreme temperatures can affect everybody and heat-related illnesses can range from mild conditions to lifethreatening heatstroke.

- ► Plan ahead and avoid activities during the hottest part of the day
- ► Check in on those most at risk
- Drink plenty of water even if you don't feel thirsty
- ► Keep cool by staying home or finding a cool place to be (libraries and shopping centres are air conditioned and open to all).



Storm

Stay up to date with weather warnings and avoid going out during stormy weather. Tips to prepare your property:

- Maintain your roof and keep your gutter, spouting and downpipes clean
- ► Trim or remove tree branches overhanging your home
- ► Inspect and fix fences regularly
- ► Secure loose items in your yard
- ► Ensure all household members know where, how and when to turn off the mains power, water and gas supply in case of an emergency.





Fires

Most fires in the home are preventable if you take steps to reduce the risks. Everybody should have working smoke alarms installed, prepare an escape plan and regularly check your house for fire risks.

- Always keep at least one metre of clear space around a heater
- ► Turn heating sources off and put out open fires before going to bed or leaving the house
- Clean the lint filter in your clothes dryer after every use
- ► Never leave a lit candle unattended
- ► Never leave cooking unattended
- ► Never overload power boards
- ► Replace damaged equipment.

Bushfires and grass fires don't only impact those living in rural areas. Fires can occur in urban areas where houses have grass, bushland or parkland around them. Stay alert for danger – monitor the Fire Danger Rating system and know if it is a day of Total Fire Ban.





Power outage

Power outages can occur at any time and can be caused by heatwaves, bushfires or storms. Be prepared for an outage by packing an emergency kit, including torches, spare batteries, a mobile phone and charger, battery-powered or wind-up radio and fresh water.

If using candles never leave them unattended and ensure placement is way from flammable materials and unstable surfaces.

Food safety can become an issue if outages last for several hours or more. Try to keep cold and frozen foods cold by moving food from fridge to freezer and only open fridges and freezers when absolutely necessary.
