Introduction

Commitment

The City of Greater Dandenong, as a Child Friendly City, is committed to supporting and providing opportunities for children and their families.

Council is guided by the UNICEF Child Friendly Cities Framework and being a signatory to the Victorian Child Friendly Cities and Communities Charter. The Charter has been developed specifically for Local Governments, organisations and individuals to take actions that protect the rights of children up to the age of 18 years. It is primarily concerned with increasing participation and creating child-friendly environments.

The City of Greater Dandenong upholds the Victorian Charter for Human Rights and Responsibilities. The Charter contains 20 rights to protect freedom, respect, equality and dignity and all Local Governments, along with the State Government and other public authorities, must adhere to it.

The City of Greater Dandenong complies with the Victorian Child Safe Standards and Reportable Conduct Scheme. The Standards and Scheme seek to prevent the abuse of children to the age of 18 years and are mandatory for all organisations providing them with services.



Vision

The City of Greater Dandenong's vision for children and their families is to be valued, celebrated, respected and supported to reach their full potential.

Strategic approach in planning for children

The Children's Plan outlines an integrated approach in working together with and for children 0-13 years, acknowledging the important role of parents, carers and their extended families in supporting each child's development in education, health and wellbeing.

Development of the Plan

The development of the Children's Plan has been informed by an extensive evidence-base developed by Council, including:

- Consultation with children, local service providers and relevant Council departments;
- A review of relevant policy frameworks at a local, state and federal level;
- Benchmarking activities;
- Review of the objectives of Council's Imagine 2030 Community Plan, Council and Community Wellbeing Plans;
- Review of the previous Children's Plan 2015–2019;
- Review of other Council strategies and plans to ensure an alignment of activities.

Review and development of the Plan

The City of Greater Dandenong will undertake annual action plans to accompany the Children's Plan review. The review of the plan will consider:

- The extent to which the actions have been implemented over the course of the plan
- To identify emerging trends and opportunities
- Being responsive to changing needs and interests of children and their families.



The role of Council

The City of Greater Dandenong is uniquely positioned to support positive outcomes for children and families. Council's close contact with the community is well placed to listen to the voices of children and families directly and to facilitate community participation. Council provides a wide range of essential services and supports to children and families. Council's role is diverse and includes: **Leader:** collaborate with tiers of government and service providers, to identify needs and mobilise innovative responses.

Planner: together with service providers, stakeholders and community, identify gaps and opportunities for responses.


Advocate: provide advocacy on local needs and priority areas of concern for children, young people and families.

Provider: facilitate opportunities for children, young people and their families to actively participate in community and civic life.

A social model of health

Council works from a social model of health, recognising the multiple factors influencing a persons' health and wellbeing by individual characteristics, lifestyle factors, social, economic and environmental factors. Children wellbeing is also strongly influenced by their family and community context. All levels of government have a key role to play in supporting families and shaping the community.

Principles

1. Leadership, Advocacy, Planning and Partnerships

Lead, advocate, plan and work in partnership to strengthen the local service system to be responsive to the changing needs of children and families.

2. Child and Family Centred Practice

Facilitate a strengths-based partnership approach in engaging families to uphold the best interests for children.

3. Continuous Improvement

Strive for continuous improvement that is evidence-based and consultative in the development of programs and services for children and families.

4. Participation and Engagement

Engage children in meaningful discussion and decision-making as active members in the community.

5. Diversity

Reflect and value the diversity of children backgrounds, opinions and experiences in the community.

6. Climate Change and Sustainability

Engage children in discussions on climate change and sustainability measures impacting their community.



Strategic Objective 1: Provide leadership and advocacy in planning for children and families

The City of Greater Dandenong has a central role to play in local infrastructure, service planning and the provision of high quality, sustainable services. Council's close proximity to the community means it is well-placed to be an advocate for community needs. Council works with all levels of government, various sectors, organisations, services and community members to create effective community outcomes.


Children have told us that 'being healthy' means not only being physically fit and well but also 'having a nice positive mind' and being 'happy, energetic and ready to learn.'²

Strategic Objective 3: Support engagement in learning, skill development and vocational pathways

Learning 'is a continuous process throughout life', children 'learn through a variety of formal and informal experiences within the classroom and more broadly in their home and in the community.' Council supports the provision of high quality early learning and care services.



Children have told us that education is important as it helps community and families be better, to communicate with everyone, and to get a job in the future.³


Strategic Objective 4: Improve safety and accessibility for children and families to participate in the community

Strategic Objective 5: Value active participation and engagement of children, and families in the community

A child friendly city implements the 'Convention on the Rights of the Child' (1990) to local communities in partnership with children. Central to the Child Friendly City concept is that children's 'voices and opinions are taken into consideration and influence governance, decision making at a local level including laws, policies, programs and budget to improve the lives of children and to create sustainable environments now and into the future.
