

Response Tilla Buden, Acting Director Community Services

Council has requested additional concept plans for the Dandenong Community Hub be developed featuring alternative layouts to the Concept Plan released for public comment in 2021. This work includes a detailed cost analysis of all the alternative layouts to gain an understanding of the expected costs of all options being considered. The time frame for delivery of this work has been adjusted accordingly. Future rounds of consultation on design will be advertised via Council's website and distributed to all stakeholders involved in previous consultation rounds.

How can our Council assist bringing all our different community groups together to work on a plan to engage as many people as possible to make our municipality a better place to live in? In 2021 Council undertook its most extensive Community Engagement exercise, for the development of the greater Dandenong Community Vision and Council Plan. Over 1000 ideas were received from the community across a broad range of consultation activities, followed by the formation of our first ever Peoples Panel to undertake a deliberative engagement process. This saw thirty-one people who were statistically representative of our community to meet over three and a half days to discuss the future of our City and the aspirations of its people. Further information on that process is available on the Council's website.

Council also have various groups and committees who meet regularly to work on their respective plans. This includes the Community Safety Committee, Sustainability Advisory Committee, the Disability Advisory Committee and Positive Ageing Committee, among others. Report Summary

The current contract of employment for Council's Chief Executive Officer (CEO), John Bennie PSM, expires on 31 July 2022.

In accordance with Council's CEO Employment and Remuneration Policy under the *Local Government Act 2020*, Mr Bennie has indicated to the CEO Employment and Remuneration Committee through the Mayor that he is seeking a new contract from 1 August to 30 November 2022 (four months only).

This will provide for advancement and finalisation of specific matters and provide the CEO Employment and Remuneration Committee sufficient time to recruit a suitable replacement.

Recommendation Summary

This report recommends that Council offers the current incumbent CEO, Mr John Bennie PSM a new employment contract from 1 August to 30 November 2022.

Background and Discussion

In accordance with section 44 of the *Local Government Act 2020*, Council must appoint a natural person to be its Chief Executive Officer in accordance with its Chief Executive Officer Employment and Remuneration Policy. This policy was endorsed by Council on 13 December 2021.

A Chief Executive Officer must be appointed under a contract of employment with Council for a period that does not exceed five years.

Proposal

The requirements of sections 44 of the *Local Government Act 2020* have been met and the proposal to offer the incumbent CEO, Mr John Bennie PSM a new four-month employment contract when the current contract expires can proceed.

Financial Implications

Report Summary

Responsible Officer:

On 8 February 2021, Council resolved to form a proprietary company limited by shares entitled South East Leisure Pty Ltd (SEL) for the purposes of managing four of Council's major leisure facilities.

Subsequently, on 15 June 2021, Council endorsed the Constitution and Management Services Agreement for SEL. This report addresses Clause 6.1 of the Management Services Agreement in that it proposes that a lease be granted to SEL by Council in respect of each of the four major leisure facilities.

Recommendation Summary

This report recommends that Council undertakes a community engagement process in respect of the proposal to lease its four major leisure centres to SEL under section 115 of the *Local Government Act 2020* and commences the community engagement process as outlined in this report (section 7).

Background

On 8 February 2021, Council resolved to form a proprietary company limited by shares entitled South East Leisure Pty Ltd (SEL) for the purposes of managing four of Council's major leisure facilities.

Subsequently, on 15 June 2021, Council endorsed the Constitution and Management Services Agreement for SEL. This report addresses Clause 6.1 of the Management Services Agreement in that it proposes a lease be granted to SEL by Council in respect of each of the four major leisure facilities. These facilities are known as:

- Dandenong Oasis (Oasis);
- Dandenong Stadium:
- Noble Park Aquatic Centre (NPAC); and
- Springers Leisure Centre (Springers).

The YMCA is currently contracted to manage Oasis, NPAC and Springers until 30 June 2022 (extension of initial contract received under Ministerial Exemption as required by the *Local Government Act 1989* – in force at that time). Elite Stadium Management is currently contracted (in overhold) for the management of the Dandenong Stadium also concluding on 30 June 2022.

Legislative Requirements

Section 115 of the *Local Government Act 2020* states (amongst other things) that a Council's power to lease any land is limited to leases for a term of 50 years or less and that, if the proposal was not included in the budget, Council must undertake a community engagement process in accordance with its Community Engagement Policy in respect of the proposal before entering into the lease. This leasing proposal was not included in Council's draft budget which was adopted in principle at Council's meeting of 26 April 2022 and will be formally adopted at the scheduled Council Meeting of 27 June 2022. A community engagement process will therefore be required for the proposed lease to SEL. This process is outlined in section 7 of this report.

Proposal

It is proposed to lease Council's four major leisure centres as listed above to SEL. The terms of the proposed lease for these centres are as follows:

Expiry Date:	1 July 2022
Expiry Date:	30 June 2032
Further Terms:	1 x further term of 10 years in accordance with the Management Services Agreement
Rent:	\$1.00 per annum plus GST
Permitted Use:	Management and operation of leisure centres in accordance with the Management Services Agreement

Other Conditions: Sections 4, 5 and 6 of the Management Services Agreement [in relation to management services (including asset management), financial matters and occupancy].

Since 15 June 2021, the appointed Board of SEL has established the administrative infrastructure and resources required to manage these four major Greater Dandenong leisure centres. This proposed lease will enable SEL to commence full management of these centres from 1 July 2022 as planned.

Financial Implication

The proposed lease provides for payment of only a nominal rental to Council. Under the Management Services Agreement, Council must pay SEL any deficits to actual quarterly earnings as a management fee. Any quarterly or annual surpluses are to be paid to Council as a dividend. Reporting standards and requirements are clearly outlined in the Management Services Agreement and are accounted for in the proposed 2022-2023 Budget and Long Term Financial Plan.

Costs for the community engagement process and legal services (in relation to the development of this lease) have been absorbed within existing budget allocations.

Consultation

Under Council's Community Engagement Policy, it is proposed to utilise the participatory engagement model. Council will inform the public of the proposal via Council's website and a public notice in the local paper circulating in Greater Dandenong and invite interested parties to make submissions regarding the proposal for a period of 21 days. Submitters will be provided with the opportunity to speak to their submissions at a meeting to be convened if it is required.

Question Cr Tim Dark

My first question is from a resident of my Ward regarding the Alan Corrigan Reserve, which I have previously raised. There has been a significant amount of people turning up to play netball or volleyball in the middle of the Reserve and the crowd keeps accumulating over time. Many residents nearby are raising concerns regarding noise and rubbish and activities are occurring earlier in the morning. I believe it was sent to the Community Services Director to investigate. Can I have an update? I have another resident raising concerns about the amount of noise and the damage done to the Reserve.

<u>Response</u>

Tilla Buden, Acting Director Community Services

Officers will investigate and advise.

<u>Question</u> Cr Tim Dark

My second question is relating to correspondence I have received from a factory owner in Olive Grove in Keysborough. It has to do with a block of five small factories and it is being dealt with by the Director of Planning and Amenity. One occupier there has had significant issues with a tenant next door. It has now got to the state where there are intervention orders and multiple Court actions. Is it possible through Planning Enforcement to have a conversation about what options are available to try and resolve the situation and see where we can go from here?

Response Jody Bosman, Director City Planning, Design and Amenity

Council is very aware of this situation. It has been investigated in detail. There have been several complaints over a period of time. Those complaints are not breaches of the Planning Scheme. The one thing that we were still looking at regarding the Planning Scheme is related to the onsite parking.

The issues that have been lodged with us for complaint have been referred to PrimeSafe Victoria, they have investigated and are dealing with it from PrimeSafe Victoria's point of view. However, from the point of view of Local laws and the Planning Scheme, there are no infringements. The matter is entirely within the hands and the jurisdiction of PrimeSafe.

The complainant has been advised of this a number of times and unfortunately the relief that the complainant is seeking is not possible through the jurisdiction of Council. We have liaised with PrimeSafe Victoria on a number of occasions.

<u>Question</u> <u>Cr Bob Milkovic</u>

I want to thank everyone on delivering Stage One of the basketball courts in Tirhatuan Park. People have been putting it to good use. I do have a question regarding the netball ring on one side. The fence is quite low and stray balls can easily end up on other courts. Can a net be installed to prevent this? It is a big court and a big walk to retrieve balls so it makes the court hard to use at times.

Response Paul Kearsley, Acting Chief Executive Officer

I will take that question on notice.

Question Cr Bob Milkovic

I want to thank the officers and contractors involved in installing the screens at the Brady Road shops. The only question I have regarding those is that I thought that these screens would be similar to what is installed in central Dandenong, the glass screens with stainless steel poles. The screens are steel, however, there is half an advertisement for the shop on the bottom and the top is a transparent screen quite susceptible to damage. Is that what was planned originally?

<u>Response</u>

Paul Kearsley, Acting Chief Executive Officer

That level of detail I am not aware of. It may well be that we have run through all of the more permanent style of barriers because the State funds have lapsed and we have run out. I will ask Mr Van Boxtel to investigate. It may be that is the type we are now using in the later circumstances pending more funding from the State Government.

Question Cr Bob Milkovic

Can I receive an update regarding when work will commence on the public toilets on Brady Road? Did the tender happen?

Response Paul Kearsley, Acting Chief Executive Officer

I will take that question on notice.

Question Cr Bob Milkovic

Could I please ask the relevant officer to increase the patrols at Rosewood Downs Primary School? There are issues there with parking. People are parking in two minute parking spots and leaving their cars. I think people need reminding to be courteous as everyone needs to drop off and pick up their children safely. Some parents tend to forget so if officers can patrol the area frequently providing a reminder for everyone to be safe.

Response Jody Bosman, Director City Planning, Design and Amenity

That has been noted and we will increase patrols in the area around Rosewood Downs Primary School.

Question Cr Sophie Tan

My first question is regarding the Ross Reserve Sport Pavilion. I met with the Noble Park Junior Football Club over the weekend. They were informed the project would be completed late this month. Could I please get an update of this project as it does not look like the project will be completed in time?

Response Paul Kearsley, Acting Chief Executive Officer

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I can find out the exact date of completion of that project and advise you.

Question Cr Sophie Tan

This is a follow up question relating to the Country Fire Authority Noble Park. They have had issues with entry and access of their fire trucks to roads, especially small roads and streets like Knox Street, Noble Park. When there are two cars parked on both sides of the street, it is very difficult for the trucks to go in and out. Can the relevant officer investigate further and give an update on what is going to be done and when?

<u>Response</u>

Paul Kearsley, Acting Chief Executive Officer

I am aware of the issue in that question. I have asked Lucas and his team in the Transport Area to meet with the Country Fire Department to talk through those issues. They have been raised previously and I have asked Lucas to have another look at those.

Question Cr Sophie Tan

Do you know how long that is going to take?

Response Paul Kearsley, Acting Chief Executive Officer

It would depend on when the meeting is.

Comment Cr Richard Lim OAM

On Thursday 12 May 2022, Mayor Jim Memeti and I attend an event for Monash Children's Hospital at the Chadstone Hotel. The event was held to acknowledge all the donors and contributors to Monash Children's Hospital in the last few years.

On Friday 13 May 2022, myself and Bernadette Dillon from Greyhound Racing Victoria discussed how to improve Springvale Activity Centre. We also discussed how to join Greyhound Racing Club and Springvale Activity Centre so we can attract more visitors to Springvale.

On Monday 16 May 2022, I attended an Economic Development meeting here.

On Wednesday 18 May 2022, I attend the Citizenship Ceremony with Mayor Jim Memeti. It was a very long one as there were two ceremonies with 290 new Citizens.

On Thursday 19 May 2022, I attend the Community Safety Forum with Mayor Jim Memeti and many other Councillors, as well as Victorian Police.

On Friday 20 May 2022, I attend National Volunteer Week at Springvale Town Hall.

On Sunday 22 May 2022, myself and many other Councillors supported Cr Lana Formoso for a good cause. We attended the Monash Children's Hospital fundraising walk. At the end of the event around \$200,000 had been raised for the Monash Children's Hospital. I think there was close to 2,000 attendees and I was asked to give a speech. Within the last couple of years, we have raised close to \$600,000. This is a charity that is very close to my heart.

I want to update everyone about the Springvale Boulevard Project. It is most likely going to be finished by the end of July or earlier. It is a very good effort and management informs me every week of the progress. The multi-level car park works have also commenced.

If you have young children or you yourself want to see beautiful lights currently at Multicultural Place in Springvale, there are beautiful night lights displayed until the end of the month.

Question Cr Richard Lim OAM

My first question is how we can handle the disabled toilet? They have been vandalised very frequently. I feel sorry for the Council because it is costly to fix. Are there any solutions to stop vandalism of our disabled toilets? Specifically, at the Number 8, Balmoral Avenue Car Park, Springvale.

Response Paul Kearsley, Acting Chief Executive Officer

Currently we have a security guard posted in that location. It is always difficult though when it comes to acts of vandalism, to have full coverage 24 hours a day. Unfortunately, we would ask community members not to do that, it does cost our community considerably if they do damage those facilities. I will investigate with regards to CCTV cameras whether we have enough cameras outside of the toilet, of course you cannot have cameras anywhere near inside.

Question Cr Richard Lim OAM

Recently, a person locked themselves into the disabled toilet. You could not get into that toilet. I do not know how to handle such a situation except to ring the police. People sleep there and stay there overnight and even for a few days.

Response Paul Kearsley, Acting Chief Executive Officer

That is a matter for the police. Certainly, with regards to any of those types of behaviours, it is not appropriate for our officers to do anything. I think in the case of you coming across those issues that a call to the Springvale police would be best.

Question Cr Richard Lim OAM

We have an issue in many Wards regarding homeless people being more active. The police have worked hard to help me. However, sometimes we have no other solution as police have a shortage of staff. The police informed me that they are not only in charge of Springvale, but they cover other areas as far as Rowville. We need more police to patrol Springvale frequently. Are there any other solutions regarding homeless people?

Response Tilla Buden, Acting Director Community Services

I will arrange for the relevant officers to meet with you directly to discuss that further.

Comment Cr Angela Long

On Tuesday 10 May 2022, I attended the Mother's Day lunch with the Mauritian Golden Age Club.

On Wednesday 11 May 2022, I attended the online meeting of the Community Safety Committee.

On Thursday 12 May 2022, I attended the online meeting with the Cultural Heritage Committee.

On Saturday 14 May 2022, I attended a Mother's Day dinner with the Italian Honour Guards.

On Tuesday 17 May 2022, I attended an online meeting of the Quarterly Kindergarten Planning meeting with Council officers.

On Wednesday 18 May 2022, I attended the Greater Dandenong volunteer week lunch.

On Friday 20 May 2022, I attended the National volunteer's week afternoon tea with Councillors and volunteers at Springvale.

Comment Cr Rhonda Garad

The Federal elections were held over the weekend. Perhaps the most consequential election of our recent times. It is good to consider the outcome of this election and what it means to our 'Back Your Neighbour' campaign led by the City of Greater Dandenong. When Mayor Memeti, I and other members of the taskforce spoke to Labor members of Parliament prior to the election, they made various commitments to us which were around eliminating temporary protecting visas, fixing the broken system so that people can be processed within six months and to increase the humanitarian intake including community sponsored visas.

We need to continue our work in pushing for swift action on these issues so that the 2000 people in Dandenong who are currently waiting for up to a decade, can get on to their lives and start to make a positive contribution to this community.

On behalf of the Council, I would like to thank the Dandenong police representatives that attended the Community Safety forum at Keysborough South. We learnt some very exciting community engagement initiatives that will build stronger ties between police and the community going forward.

Many of us here attended the Monash Children's Walk yesterday which was extremely well attended and growing enormously from year to year. We were there to support our colleague Councillor Formoso and her wonderful family who are doing it very tough. I have been given an update by Councillor Lim that approximately \$300,000 was raised which is an extraordinary amount. \$65,000 of that was in fact raised by Councillor Formoso herself which is extraordinary given what she is going through right now.

<u>Question</u> <u>Cr Rhonda Garad</u>

Regarding the timing of the costing for the single-story Concept Plan for the Dandenong Community Hub which was due this week, was not quite clear. Is that still on track?

<u>Response</u>

Tilla Buden, Acting Director Community Services

That work is still underway and it will be coming back to Council as soon as it is ready. It is not ready this week.

<u>Question</u> <u>Cr Rhonda Garad</u>

Can we have a specific time frame when that will be?

Response Tilla Buden, Acting Director Community Services

I cannot recall the date scheduled so I will take that question on notice and advise.

Question Cr Rhonda Garad

What was the outcome of the Council meeting with the Environmental Protection Agency including outcomes for air quality monitoring and improving community engagement on this issue?

<u>Response</u>

Jody Bosman, Director City Planning, Design and Amenity

I can inform you that we had a very productive meeting with the Environmental Protection Agency last Friday and we thank them for their commitments in resolving the issue with us. The amount of collaboration is genuinely heartening. They are looking to work with us over the coming months to resolving the issues there. At that meeting we agreed to continue to undertake monitoring and review of the odour complaints, so we would like to request that our community members continue to engage or to report the complaints to the Environmental Protection Agency. The Environmental Protection Agency and ourselves will prioritise these complaints to start the investigation of the suspected causes of the odours. We have also agreed to undertake a community engagement meeting in Keysborough in the next couple of months to discuss the issues around odour and at this meeting the Environmental protection agency will be looking to give monitoring devices to individual community members so that the specific scientific data can be used in identifying the areas of impact.

The Environmental Protection Agency, along with their odour scientists will attend and give a presentation to our Councillors and Executives on odours and compliance issues within our Industrial areas within the next four to eight weeks. We are very hopeful that this increased focus and partnership with the Environmental Protection Agency will resolve this long outstanding issue with the community. We have already encouraged one of the complainants in Keysborough, to avail themselves of such devices.

I think we are making good progress, there is a genuine ongoing and frequent collaboration with the Environmental Protection Agency and I think we will start getting results soon.

Comment Cr Rhonda Garad

It is pleasing that a state government agency is willing to engage with us but whilst it is great that the community in Keysborough are doing their bit, and they have been feeding an enormous amount of information to the Council which has been very pleasing. However, the commitment was around air quality monitoring further within the industrial zone and a more effective surveillance system, not just on odour but on the air quality in that.

Response

Jody Bosman, Director City Planning, Design and Amenity

This is part of the discussions we are having with them about air quality monitoring stations. There seem to be two main sites that could be the fault for many of the complaints that we are receiving. As we start narrowing down the data that we are getting from the community and other complainants, we are able to start working out how many air quality monitoring devices we will need, where they will be needed and how we are going to go about that. That is a part of the agenda for discussion with the Environmental Protection Agency.

<u>Comment</u> <u>Cr Rhonda Garad</u>

It is great that the conversations are continuing because we also need to work out how we can monitor the carcinogens that will come out of the waste energy plant that has been planned there.

Question Cr Rhonda Garad

Access to the public walkway and park have been blocked by developers in Kingcote Drive in Keysborough South. Has the Council spoken with the developers and what assurances do residents have that disruption for the surrounding community will be minimised?

Response

Paul Kearsley, Acting Chief Executive Officer

Officers were out last week with the developer and directed that all fencing and all obstructions be removed forthwith, which the developer was happy to do. The shared path on Reserve 33, Bend Road, Keysborough, is now open and there are no blockages. They have also been advised that they should not be putting any construction vehicles in the way. We have made it very clear to the developer and we now believe that there is a better understanding of what they should and should not be doing.

Question Cr Rhonda Garad

Many residents who have purchased properties in the Bend Road area were not informed that in fact they would be living next to a large industrial development. Therefore, this has come as a very great shock to them. When was this area rezoned from Farming Zone to Industrial Zone and how is the 30 metre industrial zone buffer being measured from the residential houses to the industrial development?

<u>Response</u>

Jody Bosman, Director City Planning, Design and Amenity

I do not know whether they bought more recently and were not aware but there was a very intense, vigorous, long process at the time of the rezoning of that land. The Industrial land in Keysborough South was rezoned from Farming Zone to Industrial Zone 1 in 2009 under the Planning Scheme. It was Planning Scheme Amendment C78. There was extensive exhibition and consultation at the time and the Development Plan overlaid with the description of the interface buffer formed part of that documentation.

As will all Planning Scheme Amendments, a State Government Planning Panel was established which considered amongst all of that detail, the interface between the residentially zoned land and the industrial land. It seemed appropriate to rezone this land to Industrial subject to a 30-metre buffer. Where the buffer starts and finishes along the length of the interface however changes, it varies from place to place but it is still 30 metres.

In terms of the Kingcote Drive interface, it starts on the Eastern side of Kingcote Drive and includes the footpath to the east of Kingcote Drive. In this instance there is also a 5-metre fire track at the Eastern end of the buffer area and to the west of the new industrial building. Resulting in a set back from the Easter side of Kingcote Drive to the building, being approximately 35 metres. All of that was part of the original rezoning documentation. That 35 metres is in that strip along Kingcote Drive on the easter side, does not include the width of the road. It gets measured from the edge of the width of the road through to the building. It is the width of the road plus the 35 metres.

<u>Comment</u> <u>Cr Rhonda Garad</u>

I did not mean to suggest that Council was in any way at fault there. I believe the real estate agents, when they sold the houses, did not inform people. In fact, they informed people there was going to be parks and lovely things there.

<u>Question</u> Cr Rhonda Garad

Given the rapid planning and construction timeframes for the cemetery in the Victorian State budget, what are the timeframes for the Southern Metropolitan Cemeteries Trust with finalising their proposal in particular regarding starting community consultation?

Response Jody Bosman, Director City Planning, Design and Amenity

Council has previously advised at another Council meeting and I want to reiterate that we do not believe that the money that has been allocated in the State budget is to that specific project on that specific portion of land. From what I have been informed, the allocation or reservation of that budget to the Southern Metropolitan Cemeteries Trust is to make sure that the money is set aside for an agency that is responsible for its expenditure. This site is being investigated as part of their investigations to meet the need for cemeteries within the South East area. At this stage, the Southern Metropolitan Cemeteries Trust has not lodged a rezoning application with the State Government. They are still conducting investigations. Until such time as they have lodged an application, we will not know a date for the community consultation process. It will be triggered by with lodging their rezoning.

Additionally, the view of the Councillors opposition to that project on that site has been made clearly known to them.

<u>Comment</u> <u>Cr Rhonda Garad</u>

Whilst you say that they are looking at other proposed sites, we do not know what they are. We know that on the Council documentation they still site the Heatherton Road site as the site that they are looking at. We do not know in any way that they are listening to the Council or in any way listening to the community. As far as we are aware they are continuing with their process of developing and zoning regardless of anything that we say locally. We have no guarantee that anyone is listening to us and we have a budget item in the State budget and as far as we know tomorrow they could turn around and say we will start the process. It is extremely precarious from our point of view without any feedback at all, to believe that they are listening to us.

Response Jody Bosman, Director City Planning, Design and Amenity

As far as I know they are not investigating any other sites. I think this is the only site at this stage that they are focused on. But what I said is that they have not put in an application. I think that this is very much for the area of their focus. However, the State Government has not assigned that money to that site is the difference. We do know that the Southern Metropolitan Cemeteries Trust are very much focused on this as their site.

<u>Question</u> <u>Cr Rhonda Garad</u>

What discussions have been held with other Councils in the Dandenong Creek Catchment about getting their support regarding advocacy against the cemetery proposed for the Dandenong flood plains.

Response Jody Bosman, Director City Planning, Design and Amenity

At the last Council Meeting our Chief Executive Officer advised that Council had sought to have a meeting with the Chief Executive Officer of Melbourne Water and that we were still awaiting a response to that request. I can advise that we have received a response and that a meeting with the Chief Executive Officer of Melbourne Water and some of the executives of Melbourne Water is scheduled for some time mid-June. At this stage there have been no meetings with other Councils in the Creek Catchment and this will be followed up as soon as we have had that meeting then with Melbourne Water.

Question Cr Rhonda Garad

What is the time frame for getting the Keysborough South Community Hub out to tender?

<u>Response</u>

Paul Kearsley, Acting Chief Executive Officer

The timeframe is June 2022

Comment Cr Eden Foster

I want to start by congratulating the Australian Labor Party on being elected to the Federal Government. What that means for Greater Dandenong is that we get \$20million towards the Dandenong Wellbeing Centre and Noble Park Aquatic Centre upgrades.

Along with Councillor Garad, I note that when I first came on Council, one of the questions I put to the Council is that we write to the Immigration Minister of the Day seeking to have the Biloela family moved back to Biloela. That letter was not responded to and not acted on, but we know that a Labor Government will act on that. It is quite moving to know that this family who have been stuck in detention, two little girls born in Australia who should be considered Australians, will now be able to go back to Biloela where they are loved and where the whole family can contribute to society.

I also want to acknowledge that last week was Volunteers Week and there were a number of events that many of the Councillors attended as part of that. I want to thank our volunteers in the City of Greater Dandenong for the hard work that they do. They save our community millions of dollars because of the hard work and effort they contribute because they want to be there and they are passionate about volunteering. I attended the Greater Dandenong Volunteer Resource Service volunteer week event, celebrating the hard work that our volunteers do which was lovely.

I also attended with several of our fellow Councillors, the Community Safety Forum at Tatterson Park. I believe we had an increase in residents attending but it would be much better to see many more attending and voicing their concerns and taking up the opportunity to ask questions to Victoria Police and Councillors.

Also with my fellow Councillors, I attended the Monash Children's Hospital Walk raising funds on behalf of team Lucozade. An amazing facility in our area and they do such great work so it was fantastic that we were able to support something like that and also support our fellow Councillor Lana Formoso and her family.

Question Cr Eden Foster

I have brought to Council's attention some concern on Dunblane Road in Noble Park. It is being utilised as a thoroughfare between Heatherton Road and Princes Hwy. I would like an update on this matter?

Response Paul Kearsley, Acting Chief Executive Officer

I will follow up with the traffic team and provide a response. Apologies if it has been sitting with us for some time.

Question Cr Eden Foster

Another concern that has come to my attention is the Ian Street crossing at Heatherton Road in Noble Park. I believe there is a concrete island that makes it difficult for people who are using wheelchairs or even prams. One of the residents who is wheelchair bound has had to go into Heatherton Road to get around the concrete island. Which, you can imagine is quite dangerous, and so I do have significant concerns for this resident. Is there anything that we can do to investigate that and potentially add a pedestrian crossing that is raised to make it easier to cross that T-intersection.

<u>Response</u>

Paul Kearsley, Acting Chief Executive Officer

Those works were undertaken by the Level Crossing Removal Authority, and we do not agree that they are at a suitable standard. We were fortunate that we are about to undertake Ian Streetscape improvement works. We added that additional issue into those works and the plans are now on display for a period of time for community consultation and that project is budgeted through both Council's budget and the Noble Park Revitalisation Board budget as well. Whilst it is not immediate, there will be improvements coming with regards to that issue that you raised.

<u>Comment</u> <u>Cr Angela Long</u>

This woman is permanently in a wheelchair and she has to go out onto Heatherton Road, which is not safe at all. We must do something as soon as possible for her and other people in motorised scooters that cannot walk.

Question Cr Eden Foster

You mentioned consultation on that matter, when will that consultation period end?

Response Paul Kearsley, Acting Chief Executive Officer

I will send an email around advising once I get onto the website.

<u>Question</u> Cr Eden Foster

Another issue has come up with regards to the laneway that runs parallel to lan Street. This particular laneway is not lit at all and some unsavoury happenings occur in that laneway. It is right next to the Yooralla Disability Services. As part of the streetscape that you refer to are we able to look at addressing the concerns that are present in that laneway and making it more pleasing to the eye as well?

Response

Paul Kearsley, Acting Chief Executive Officer

I will take that question on notice and see if it is in the design. The website is now telling me construction is June-July this year. Those street works are imminent.

Question Cr Sean O'Reilly

A resident has brought to my attention a situation regarding Sandown train station. The station entrance at Lightwood Road has a couple of issues that I would like to ask the Director of Planning.

The first one is that apparently there is a large skip bin positioned there, partially full and has been there for several months and it is not apparent as to why it is still there. We want to keep things clean and tidy and have pride in where we live. I would appreciate if the Council could make some enquiries as to what the purpose of that skip was or is.

The second part is nearby, Lightwood Road, Sandown train station entrance, there are charity donation bins. Around the bins there is rubbish on the ground and these donation bins tend to attract rubbish because they get full and people just decide they will just put their donations on the foot path. Does Council check for rubbish around these donation bins with regularity? I acknowledge that the charities have good intentions and do good work. However, the charity should be responsible for any amenity impacts of their donation bins and within reason making sure that the donation bins are emptied regularly and not kept full. Regarding these donation bins, what powers does Council have? Did we grant them a permit? If they do not clean up around their bin can we revoke their permit?

<u>Response</u>

Jody Bosman, Director City Planning, Design and Amenity

I think the charities themselves are as frustrated as you and I are about how their charity bins are abused for the purpose of simply dumping rubbish. We know that it is costing the agencies. They are spending millions of dollars each year of that money that would otherwise go to social good. Spending millions of dollars a year disposing oof rubbish that has been dumped as rubbish. Some of these sites have CCTV and we have had success in recent times of identifying many dumpers and have prosecuted them for dumping outside collection points. It is a requirement that those bins are cleaned and cleared and attended to regularly and we have an ongoing discussion these agencies. I also recall this one at Sandown as being on VicTrack land and not on land that we have got any jurisdiction over. Nonetheless, I will follow up and see if we can get that tidied up. We do have an ongoing consultation with and through our local laws team. Most of them operate well enough and where those bins are not being looked after we require them to be removed
