#### Introduction

The Springvale Community Hub Strategic Plan was developed to provide a direction for the Hub over the first 5 years, incorporating goals, inspirations and expectations and to deliver the Vision for the hub:

Encouraging active participation in cultural exchange, creative celebrations and life-long learning, through a welcoming community hub that inspires learning and creative living.





The Strategic plan outlines four Strategic Objectives:



1. Engagement & Activation



2. Connectedness



3. Learning & Creative Living



4. Safety & Sustainability

The Action Plan 2020 – 2022 was developed for delivery over an initial 2-year period, from the time of endorsement in September 2020 to June 2022.

It was intended that the timeline for delivery would enable establishment of the hub, public opening and delivery of the actions allowing for unknown impacts of ongoing COVID-19 restrictions.





The Springvale Community Hub opened in October 2020, during a range of COVID-19 restrictions. Since opening the hub has been impacted by a range of restrictions until April 2022, when the whole hub was able to open with minimal restrictions.

Due to the impact of COVID-19, a number of actions have been delayed or are proposed to be carried forward to the new Action Plan development.

This aside, there have been a range of very successful stories and outcomes, including some significant community led projects and programs.





### 1. Engagement & Activation

The Hub is a gathering place where everyone feels welcome and engaged, spaces and outdoor areas will promote learning, participation and engagement through stimulating programs and activities.

## Engagement & Activation Highlight

# Springvale Community Hub Community Celebration

On Saturday 5 March 2022 the community came together to celebrate Springvale Community Hub.

The festivities were opened by a Bunurong Elder as part of a Welcome to Country, followed by a range of performances from local cultural groups throughout the afternoon. Local services and organisations such as Wellsprings for Women, Springvale Neighbourhood House, Maralinga Community Gardens and many more provided free activities for families, a range of workshops were held inside the building, and rides and a silent disco were among the popular outdoor offerings.

Inclement weather cleared enough for the duration of the event, and over 4000 people attended the day. The event was an opportunity for the community to connect with local services, celebrate the diversity of the Springvale area and explore the new Springvale Community Hub.

The community is connected, people participate, celebrate and embrace their cultural heritage with pride and feel like they belong.

# Connectedness Highlight

#### City of Greater Dandenong Clothes Swap

An example of empowering the local community, is the clothes swap at the Hub, which was developed after receiving community feedback.

The activity is a partnership between community members and Council's Springvale Community Hub team. After 6 months of planning and rescheduling due to COVID-19 restrictions, the inaugural clothes swap was launched in November 2021 with great support and interest from the local community.

Since the inaugural event, the clothes swap has had a regular presence at the Hub and has established some regular participants and volunteers.

# Learning & Creative Living Highlight

#### **COVID Digital Certificate Help Desk**

In partnership with local agencies and services, Council set up the Digital Certificate Help Desks at Springvale Community Hub and Harmony Square.

The Help Desk assisted community members with a range of activities included creating accounts, linking myGov to Medicare, downloading certificates, linking to the Service Victoria app and providing information about vaccination pop up centres.

The help desks were supported by library staff working alongside local Job Advocates, bicultural workers and nurses from many community partners including: Settlement Services International, SEPHU – Monash Health, Concern Australia, South East Community Links, Brotherhood of St Lawrence, The Bridge and Dandenong Neighbourhood House.

The strong positive community response has highlighted the need for this initiative, and assisted over 1300 community members over both sites.





### 4. Safety & Sustainability

The Hub will engage in proactive programs that reduce antisocial behaviours, promote awareness of environmental sustainability practices and programs and respond to safety concerns.

#### **6-Star Green Star rating**

Springvale Community Hub achieved a 6-star Green Star and carbon-neutral rating through innovative design.

The building includes rainwater management systems, large photovoltaic panels and efficient heating/cooling systems. The northern façade acts as veranda and veil, sheltering the building and creating a series of protected outdoor spaces along its edge – all focused towards the River Red Gums. Large windows perforate the building's envelope in every direction, improving light and reducing energy consumption. Along with the 6-star Green Star rating, the building has received a number of awards:
